Based on the article, it appears that Mr Clark appears to be in serious breach of article 1.4 of the Councillor's Code of Conduct. (Link below).

If this article is correct, and it appears that Mr Clark is aware of it and has not made any attempt to deny any of it, then there are 3 major issues:

- 1. He has revealed the details of a confidential complaint to the person that the complaint was about, including personal information about the person who has initiated it which appears to have led to confrontation between the 2 parties.
- 2. He has a personal interest in the issue in that he owns the property that the complaint was about and as such should not have had personal involvement in the complaint.
- 3. This is a potential breach of Data Protection Law which I believe is potentially a criminal offence.

It is my personal opinion that any member of the public should feel that they can approach any Councillor, especially the leader of the council knowing that their issue is going to be dealt with in total confidence. His actions totally undermine the very principles of local government. His actions, should the newspaper article be correct, potentially undermine the very fabric of public confidence in local government and bring the whole authority into disrepute. There have been discussions on social media about this incident (of which I have been part of) and unfortunately it appears that the feeling of some local people is that Councillors can and do act with total impunity.

I therefore request that this situation is investigated as a matter of the utmost urgency by the conduct committee and I look forward to your prompt response to this matter.

Dear Mr Lewis

Firstly, thank you for your swift response and I apologise for my slightly tardy reply. I thought I'd made my reasons for my complaint reasonably clear, however, I will attempt to provide clarification for my motivation behind it below. I have to say initially that I'm slightly disappointed to think that an apology is in any way an acceptable resolution to a potential breach of the code of conduct and data protection laws.

I have no personal grudge with Mr Clark, I don't personally know him, I don't believe that I've ever met him or had any type of contact with him. I have no party political affiliation personally so this complaint is not in any way linked to any type of party politics.

I am an administrator on the March Free Discussion Facebook group which incidents like this are freely discussed by the local public and whilst I understand that the opinions shown on there may not represent the majority of the public, there appears to be increasing feeling that our local politicians can act with impunity with no accountability which in turn leads to apathy in politics which is bad for democracy. My opinion is that councillors far too often appear in our local newspapers for the wrong reasons, in this case, bringing the position as leader of FDC into disrepute. At the same time I do acknowledge that many of them do excellent jobs in serving the community.

Therefore, as this is not of a personal nature, I do not feel that an apology is appropriate for my complaint. My complaint is effectively on behalf of the citizens of Fenland who deserve better from their elected officials. I'm slightly disappointed that incidents like this are not investigated as a matter of course by the relevant department when there appears to be strong evidence from the article in the Cambs Times to suggest that the code of conduct has been broken.

You mentioned in your email about contacting Tina Gambell as an independent person, would it be possible for you to forward all of this correspondence to her regarding this matter?

Further to your communication of last week, here are my responses to the complaint from

 He has revealed the details of a confidential complaint to the person that the complaint was about, including personal information about who initiated it, which appears to have led to a confrontation between the two parties.

Although I did share the complaint with my tenant, having reflected on this, it may not have been the most appropriate course of action. I was keen to acknowledge this with the complainant and as such made early contact with them as part of a positive discussion with them I felt it appropriate to offer a full apology, which I believe was accepted. Complaint suggests a confrontation between the two parties, as far as I am aware, there was only one email exchange between them, but not face to face confrontation.

2. He has a personal interest in the issue in that he owns the property that the complaint was about and as such should not have had a personal involvement in the complaint.

From the very outset of this matter and based upon the potential for planning enforcement action, I have made it very clear that I have dealt with this matter as landlord and not leader of the council. Furthermore, I immediately reported this issue to the council portfolio holder of planning in order that any appropriate enforcement could be pursued by planning officers, without the suggestion of any inappropriate conflict of interference by me, therefore, I reject the suggestion by that I have a 'personal interest' in this matter and acted inappropriately as a councilior.

3. This is a potential breach of data protection law which I believe is potentially a criminal offence.

As the complaint was not marked private and confidential and also a swift response to the complaint was requested, I have taken action as landlord to resolve the issues quickly. I don't believe this is a breach of the date protection law, nor a criminal offence.

Fenland District Council leader John Clark leader admitted sending a complaint about unauthorised use of land to the man running a business from there without telling the complainant he owned the site.

Clir Clark was informed by this newspaper last Thursday of our investigation and on Monday night issued a statement admitting what he had done

INVESTIGATION

"In my capacity as landlord I have now had a number of helpful and positive conversations with the complainants," he said.

"I have offered them my unreserved apologies for sharing their complaint with my tenant. I have also confirmed to them that I am the owner of the property."

Clir Clark also revealed he had "further considered my position and have reached an agreement with my tenant to terminate his tenancy of my property."

The admission followed our investigation that Clir Clark had forwarded the complaint about an unauthorised car repairs business to the trader being complained about without revealing he owned the site at the centre of the dispute.

"I don't have an axe to grind against Mr Clark but his behaviour in passing my complaint and contact details to the person I was complaining about is totally unprofessional," said the man who complained.

Councillor Kit Owen emailed Clir Clark to say that "it has been brought to my attention you are the landlord of the building in question. Are you involved as a councillor or landlord?

"If the latter, your interest is pecuniary and therefore you should consider your position."

Clir Owen says he wants to know "how did this complainte? Curiouser and curiouser as this is ostensibly a

planning issue. Is there nothing confidential about complaints anymore? What is your response to the complainant or did you leave that in the hands of the complainee by advising him of the said complaint?"

The man who complained wrote to Cllr Clark saying that "as leader of Fenland Council I had expected you would take the trouble to reply to me personally about the matter I raised with you by email. It "However it seems you passed my private email to a third party who

now proceeds to call me a liar.

"Quite frankly your behaviour in d
this matter is appalling."

The original complaint said a
motor repair business had been operating from the site at the junction of r
Alpha Street and Station Road.

"He has squeezed up to 10 cars on the parcel of land and works on them at all times of the day and evening including on a Sunday," said the v

complainant. "He also parks a flatback recovery vehicle on the double yellow lines

causing traffic issues at an already dangerous junction. He also leaves it on double yellow lines overnight."

The letter of complaint said the matter was causing concern to many residents and posed a danger if oil was not being stored and drained correctly.

Clir Clark, whose declaration of interests on the Fenland Council website refers to an unspecified piece of land in Station Road, is the owner of the site that was previously a building belonging to the March

Allotments and Gardens Association.
"There appears to have been no plans for a change of use and if there had been we are sure the nearby residents would have objected in the strongest possible terms," said the complainant.

Contents of the email sent by Bryon Harris, a friend of the business complained of, said the work carried on there was an auto-electrical business.
