This application for a review of the premises licence for Haran's, 10 Norfolk Street, Wisbech. PE13 3LD is being submitted by the Director of Public Health at Cambridgeshire County Council. This is following a two test purchases of tobacco being undertaken by Cambridgeshire Trading Standards on the 17th of January 2018 and then again on the 19th of June 2019 (part of a multi-agency enforcement day).

The Licensing committee needs to be aware that there are consequences of selling illicit tobacco as set out below:

- Maintaining higher prices of tobacco (making tobacco less affordable) is a key component of the UK's comprehensive strategy of tobacco control, and is one of the six internationally recognised cross-cutting strands that the current government supports in Health Lives, Healthy People: A Tobacco Control Plan for England.
- The availability of illicit tobacco trade, which makes cheap tobacco readily available in local communities, undermines licit tobacco prices and this fundamental component of the UK's comprehensive tobacco control strategy.
- Often illicit tobacco trade is seen as a victimless crime; however, this is not the case, illicit tobacco trade makes it easier for children to start smoking, takes advantage of cash-strapped families, and helps fund organised crime. Additionally, if the cigarettes or tobacco is counterfeit they will not necessarily meet industry safety standards, such as fire safety standards (e.g. RIP Reduced Ignition Propensity standards), which can cause greater safety risks to local communities, particularly through increased residential fires.
- The problems linked with illicit tobacco are wider than the loss of revenue to the exchequer, although this in itself is substantial. Illicit tobacco fuels teen smoking by being sold at pocket money prices often packets are old for £2 or £3, and are frequently sold in individual sticks (a practice that has been illegal in the UK since 1991 (The Children's and Young Persons (Protection from Tobacco) Act, 1991) with each cigarette stick being sold for pennies.
- Illicit tobacco worsens health inequalities as the sellers often target areas of high deprivation and low income, and it harms local businesses by removing their customers, as well as undermining wider tobacco control measures.
- Removing illicit tobacco supplies in local areas will strengthen and re-enforce the Governments' policies on tobacco tax and pricing which is known to promoting smoking cessation among current users, deterring young people from starting to smoke, and reducing how much continuing users consume.

Haran's has been granted a licence to sell alcohol. This comes with the following responsibilities:

To not sell alcohol to people under the age of 18 and to ensure that age verification is in

To not sell alcohol to people who present drunk Not to sell alcohol when there is no designated place supervisor present To ensure appropriate training is in place Haran's has now been found to be selling illicit tobacco on two separate occasions with an 18 month gap. If the owner does not pay attention to the laws around control of tobacco then owner is acting illegally and is therefore in breach of the licensing objective to "prevent crime and disorder". The owner is also selling products which cannot be guaranteed to meet safety controls/standards which are in force in respect of the sale of tobacco. The owner is therefore in breach of the licensing objective to maintain "public safety". This evidence calls into question how suitable the owner is to hold a licence to sell alcohol and in the opinion of the Director of Public Health Licensing committee should consider removing the alcohol licence for Haran's.
